Dear UJCC Friends and Family,

People differ on how they experience New Year's Day. Some people make a list of New Year's resolutions. Some sign up for gym membership, while others begin to learn how to play a musical instrument. Some others, like me, give up on making New Year's resolutions since they learned that they can't stick to the resolutions for more than three days. Some plan to work more in the New Year, while others plan to play more. For some people, the New Year's Day is more important than any other day in the year, while for some others, it is "just another day." How about you? Do you have new hopes, dreams, and resolutions for the New Year? How would you like to start the new year?

Whether or not we recognize New Year's Day as a special day, I believe the significance of this "new day" for Christians comes from our belief that every day is actually a new day, another opportunity to serve, and a loving "present" from God. New Year's Day is a great symbol that reminds us of the new day God allows us to experience everyday. Yes, in a sense, it is just another day. The same old life problems that have been heavy on our shoulders do not really go away just because it is a new year. However, if we can open our hearts and pay attention to God's grace in our daily life, we may be able to see that it is a blessing that ever since God created the heavens and the earth there is evening and there is morning (Genesis 1:5). Everyday is God's new creation.

I believe that what we are called to do in order to experience God's new creation in our daily life throughout the New Year is to change our perspective. Paul, in his letter to the Corinthians, proclaims that: "From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2 Corinthians 5:16-17, NRSV)

Here, the Scripture is telling us that the secret to become "a new creation" is to change our perspective. Paul says that we once knew Christ from a human point of view. If we see Jesus Christ from a human point of view, what we see is a man who was betrayed, abandoned, and crucified. The Christ crucified is "a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles (1 Corinthians 1:21)". However, everything looks different when we are *in* Christ. When we are in Christ, we experience the unceasing love of God manifested in the life, death, and resurrection of the Christ. When we are in Christ, we realize that we do not have to justify anything to be

loved by the Most High. When we are in Christ, no matter how tough it might seem, our life has a meaning and purpose to expand the Kingdom of God on earth. When we are in Christ, though “the grass withers and flowers fall” (Isaiah 40:8), I am always a new creation: “Behold, everything old has passed away, everything has become new.”

May this God’s grace and peace bless your brand new days in 2018, mold you to become a new creation, and enable you to continuously create the Kingdom of God in your family, school, work, church and everywhere you go.

"GAMAN," DON'T MISS THIS DISPLAY at the "M St Arts Complex," (NW corner of Stanislaus & M St). The Complex will be open Tue, Thur & Fri, 1-4 PM.

THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE PAST AND FUTURE

Beginning in January, Dan Eberly and Ted Uyesaka will be sharing the duties of the Property Committee chairmanship. They will be inheriting a number of substantive projects including two new ones. Western Lightsource estimates that replacing the church's existing lights with LEDs would save enough electricity to pay for itself in two years. These savings are not just hype because PG&E believes in them enough to offer the church a zero interest loan to pay for a \$20,500 conversion based on that increased efficiency. The church will not repay PG&E with what it has in the bank, but over time with the estimated savings due to the LED conversion.

The second project will meet a need of our increasingly active youth groups. A committee is looking at the feasibility of creating a dual basketball/volleyball court between the vegetable garden and the back parking lot. This site might also function as a parking area during special events like our Crafts Fair.

Since September the solar array has been active and the church currently has a credit balance of \$186 with PG&E.

The Karesansui (Japanese rock garden) is essentially finished, but we plan future improvements in the garden between the Karesansui and the church building. Additional memorial bricks need to be added to the memorial path and some corrections made to existing brick calligraphy and mons.

The carpets in the narthex, hallway and fellowship hall will be replaced in 2018. Linda Alexander heads a committee which is carefully investigating options.

The entire parking lot is long overdue for repair of cracks and seal coating, an estimated \$13,000 project.

The tent over the barbeque area has been replaced once, but is again in tatters. Randy Isogawa is investigating a metal alternative.

As you can see, the new leadership has a number of promising improvements to be completed in the near future.

As chairperson of the Property Committee over the last seven years, it is has been exciting to work with members who have identified so many projects which improved the church infrastructure and appearance. These include the following:

1. A new PVC membrane roof,
2. A new air-conditioning and heating system,
3. A new audio and video projection system.
4. Painting the church exterior and front fence.
5. Increasing our water conservation by the converting the front lawn to a Karesansui..
6. Reducing a \$17,000 per year electrical bill to one costing less than \$100 by erecting solar car ports.
7. Honoring members of the church who served in the armed forces as well as loved ones with a memorial brick path- a project which also raised \$17,000 in donations.

JACL Sends Ninety Japanese American and Asian American Young Adults to Japan

Ninety Japanese American and Asian American participants are set to travel to Japan today as part of the JACL Kakehashi Project. Our group is part of a broader program funded by the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs to foster cultural exchange between different countries and Japan.

Participants will explore Japan beginning in Tokyo before splitting into groups to Osaka and Nagano. They will be provided educational sessions about Japan's economy, politics, people, and community. The trip also includes a homestay experience where students will be hosted by Japanese families.

This trip's participants range in age from 18-25 and represent a diversity of states from Hawaii to Vermont to Florida, representing 13 different states altogether. The group consists of college students and young professionals representing many colleges and universities as well as a broad spectrum of interests and majors.

JACL views the Kakehashi trip as an important channel for outreach to young Japanese Americans. JACL President Gary Mayeda will be accompanying the group as a supervisor and offers his thoughts: "The Kakehashi trip is an important program for both JACL and the Japanese government to help young Japanese Americans to understand our shared cultural heritage and how it has played a role in shaping who we are individually and as a community. I expect to learn a lot myself."
